- -SE included in Bangsamoro development plans (Philippines)

Education policy

- Curriculum change so that social enterprise becomes a formal part of the curriculum in Business Schools (Vietnam)

Result 2.2: SE intermediaries are strengthened to provide support services to social enterprises (Philippines)

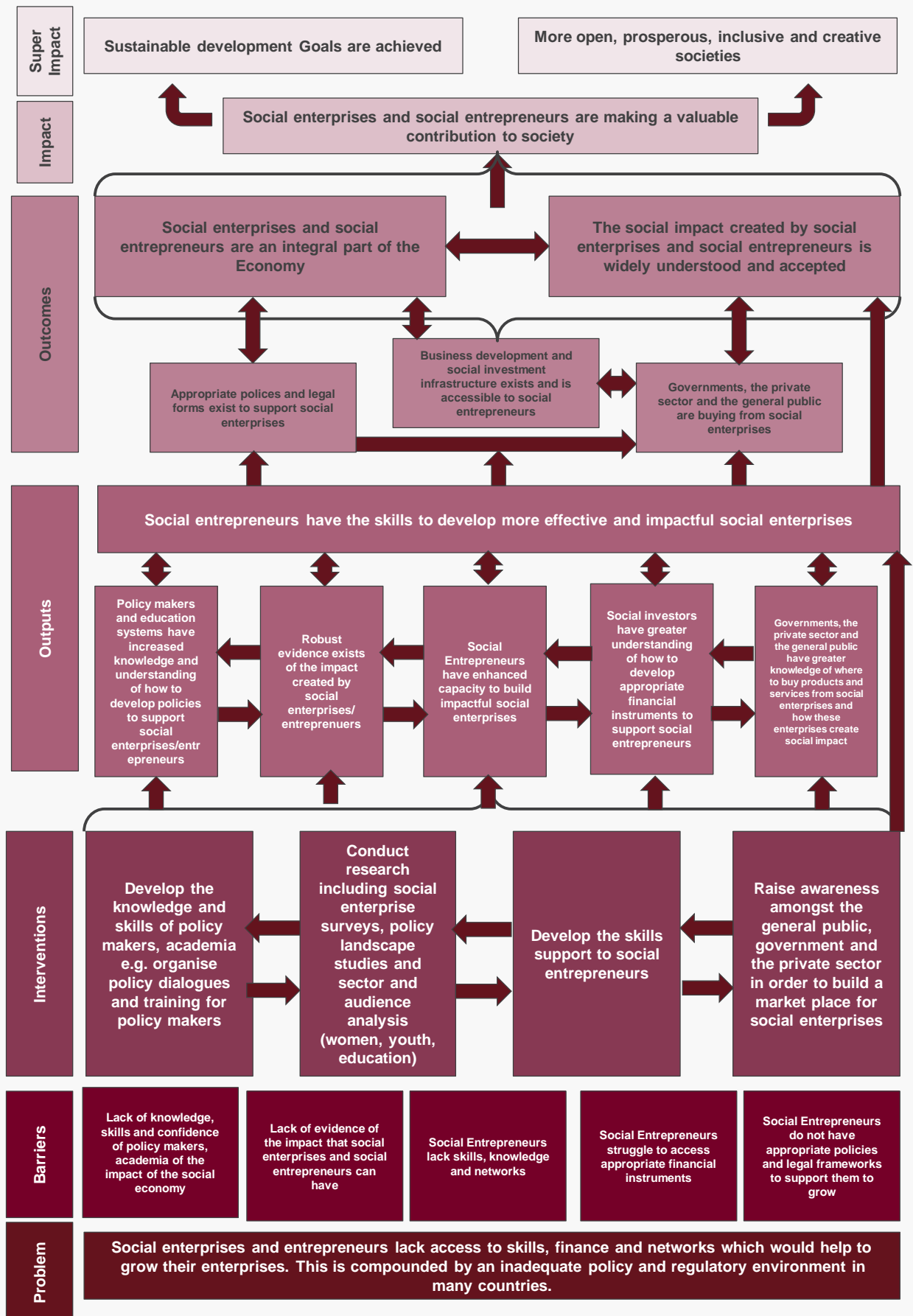
Result 2.3: Improved community engagement in Corporate Social Responsibility programmes (Malaysia and Indonesia, Vietnam)

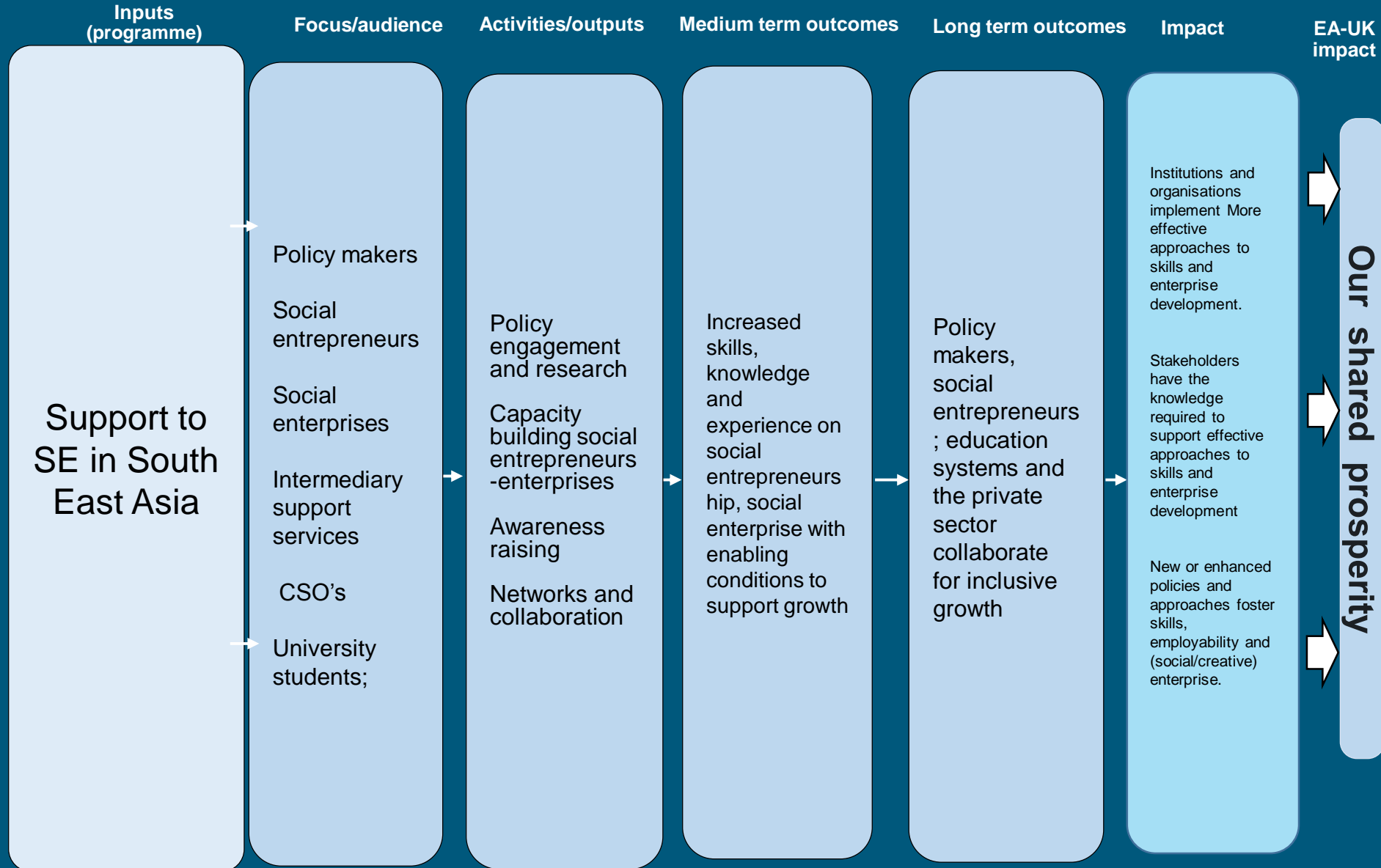
