The British Council East Asia Education Week was held in Indonesia from 3–6 February 2026. Now in its third year, the event brought together leaders from the UK and East Asia’s education sectors, including policymakers, university representatives, transnational education (TNE) practitioners, alumni, and education agents. The event provided a platform for meaningful dialogue, fresh insights, and collaborative opportunities to explore key trends and shape the future of education across the region.

Engagement and Collaboration

The event successfully brought together UK universities, ThinkTNE practitioners, education agents from the region along with UK alumni, to support the British Council's initiatives. The event also welcomed media representatives from Indonesia, Vietnam, and the UK, and received support from student volunteers from Universitas Prasetiya Mulya.

High-Profile Engagement

East Asia Education Week 2026 benefited from strong participation and endorsement from senior leaders in government and across the higher education sectors in both Indonesia and the UK.



The event welcomed engagement from H.E. Professor Brian Yulianto, Minister of Higher Education, Science, and Technology, Republic of Indonesia. His participation underscored Indonesia's national commitment to international higher education collaboration and partnership development.



Dr Hassan Wirajuda, Rector of Universitas Prasetiya Mulya, highlighted the role of host institutions in enabling international collaboration and emphasised that TNE contributes to academic excellence, innovation, and long-term institutional impact.



Lindawaty, Chief of Operations at D-Hub SEZ, reinforced the importance of ecosystem development and invited international partners to engage with the D-Hub SEZ as a platform for building sustainable education and research partnerships.



Special reflections were delivered by Professor Stella Christie, Vice Minister of Higher Education, Science, and Technology, Republic of Indonesia, who noted that current TNE initiatives increasingly reflect a multilateral approach, positioning Indonesia more firmly within the global knowledge economy.



The programme also featured an opening keynote from Professor Sir Steve Smith, UK Government International Education Champion, who emphasised that TNE has the potential to act as an engine of global progress, connecting shared ambitions for a sustainable future through collaboration, trust, and long-term partnership.

New Partnership Milestone

The event also marked a significant milestone for UK–Indonesia collaboration. Ahead of the ThinkTNE Forum on 4 February 2026, Universitas Padjadjaran (Unpad) and the University of Dundee formalised their partnership through the signing of a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) to strengthen collaboration in academic development and research.

The MoU was signed by Unpad’s Vice Rector for Academic and Student Affairs, Professor Zahrotur Rusyda Hinduan, and the University of Dundee’s Vice Principal for Global Engagement and Future Students, Professor Kim Dale. The ceremony was witnessed by H.E. Professor Brian Yulianto, Minister of Higher Education, Science, and Technology of Indonesia; Professor Sir Steve Smith; and Summer Xia, Country Director Indonesia and Director Southeast Asia, British Council, alongside higher education leaders attending the forum.

This partnership reflects both institutions’ commitment to advancing international academic cooperation, fostering joint research, and contributing to the development of TNE amid a growing shift towards multilateral partnerships in global higher education.

Partnership and Sponsorship

The event benefited from strong partnerships across the education sector. Universitas Prasetiya Mulya was the main host, with Universities and Colleges Admissions Service (UCAS) as Event Partner. The PIE News supported the event as Media Partner, amplifying its reach and sector

engagement. Exhibitors included Oxford International Education Group, Acumen, Noble Solutions, Grok Global Services, ApplyBoard, and British Council IELTS. They added tangible on-site value by providing participants with direct access to information, insights, and pathways aligned with their interests.

Conclusion

East Asia Education Week 2026 reinforced the growing importance of multilateral collaboration in shaping the future of international higher education. The event convened policymakers, institutional leaders, alumni, and education agents in Indonesia, creating a dynamic space for strategic dialogue, partnership formation, and knowledge exchange across the region.

The event demonstrated Indonesia’s increasing role as an emerging hub for TNE and innovation, while highlighting the UK’s continued value as a trusted partner in system development, institutional collaboration, and talent mobility. Tangible outcomes, including new institutional partnerships, strengthened stakeholder networks, and expanded engagement with education ecosystem actors, underscored the practical impact of the programme beyond convening.

Overall, the East Asia Education Week 2026 advanced regional connectivity, supported institutional internationalisation ambitions, and contributed to a shared vision of sustainable, collaborative growth in TNE across East Asia.

About the Conference

The East Asia Agents Conference 2026 – Empowering Local Insight for Global Impact brought together decision-makers and senior leaders of study abroad agencies from across the region to explore how education agents can continue to champion UK education in a rapidly changing world.

Under the theme Global Pivot, Local Power, the conference examined how agents were adapting to shifting geopolitics, demographic changes, evolving visa policies, and growing

competition from regional markets. Through a dynamic programme of keynote speeches, panel discussions, and breakout sessions, participants gained insights into market trends, student expectations, and the tools and strategies shaping the future of international student recruitment.

The event also highlighted the UK Agent Quality Framework (AQF) and provided a platform for networking, strengthening collaboration, trust, and quality across agents, UK institutions, and sector bodies.

Audience

The conference audience comprised industry leaders, practitioners, international student recruitment managers of UK universities, managing directors from overseas education agencies in the East Asia region, and distinguished senior officials from prominent agencies.

About the Conference

This was the third ThinkTNE Forum, the British Council East Asia’s flagship platform for dialogue on transnational education. Building on the success of the inaugural forum in Malaysia in 2019 and the second forum in 2024 in Hong Kong, this year’s event once again brought together education leaders, policymakers, and TNE practitioners from the UK and East Asia to exchange insights and shape the future of international education across the region.

As TNE in East Asia continues to evolve, institutions are increasingly moving beyond traditional bilateral arrangements towards multilateral partnership models. This shift is driven by several factors, including constraints on institutional resources, the need for greater collective impact, and changing learner expectations around the flexibility, relevance, and international recognition of qualifications. These dynamics align with broader global trends outlined in the British Council’s long-term outlook on international education.

Against this backdrop, the ThinkTNE Forum 2026 was designed to provide a dedicated platform for policymakers, higher education leaders, quality assurance agencies, and TNE practitioners from the UK and East Asia to critically examine the “what, why, and how” of multilateral partnerships in transnational education, while identifying pathways for sustainable and future-oriented collaboration.

Audience

The ThinkTNE Forum convened senior university leaders, TNE directors, partnership specialists, policymakers, and quality assurance experts from across the UK and East Asia. The audience

comprised key decision-makers shaping institutional strategy, offshore delivery, and regulatory alignment, enabling focused discussions on governance, operational excellence, and the sustainable growth of UK–East Asia TNE partnerships.

Campus Visit

Deakin University Lancaster University Indonesia (DLI) Campus

This visit was designed to connect the forum’s strategic discussions with real-world practice, offering participants the opportunity to observe effective models of high-quality TNE. As one of the leading UK–Indonesia branch campuses, DLI provides valuable insights into successful TNE delivery and potential paths to strengthen or expand multilateral partnerships.

BSD Special Economic Zone Visit

The BSD Special Economic Zone was selected as a showcase because it demonstrates how SEZs can operationalise TNE strategies on the ground. With a focus on education, healthcare, digital economy, and creative industries, BSD SEZ aligns closely with areas of UK higher education strength. For UK universities, the zone offers concrete opportunities to establish branch campuses, joint programmes, and research and innovation activities within a mature, well-connected township, supported by fiscal and non-fiscal incentives and an existing education–industry ecosystem. As such, BSD SEZ is positioned as a strategic entry point for sustainable and impact-oriented UK–Indonesia TNE collaboration.

Briefing with Indonesia’s Government Scholarship Provider

The event brought together senior representatives from the Government of Indonesia, Indonesia Endowment Fund for Education (LPDP), and UK higher education institutions to discuss the future direction of UK–Indonesia collaboration in higher education, research, and TNE. Convened by the British Council, the session served as a strategic platform to align international academic partnerships with Indonesia’s long-term national development agenda.

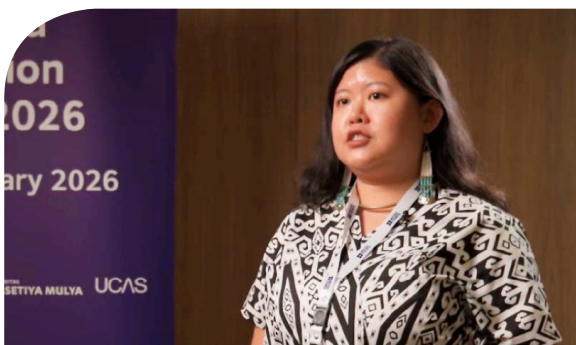
"The biggest single change that's hit me in the last few years is the rise of transnational education. The model used to be that students travelled around the world to study at top universities. But what we've done in Britain and other major countries is to develop programmes whereby universities set up campuses or joint programmes or distance learning in other countries. So now, about 685,000 students a year from abroad study in the UK; about 660,000 study transnational education. That's changed massively. So, the biggest surprise has been the significant rise of TNE."
